Women's Reproductive Health Survey

- First survey in thirty years targeted towards Active Duty Service women
- Provides insight into experiences, needs, and preferences on contraceptive choices and access.
- · Highest response rate of recent surveys

•Key findings:

- The majority of Active Duty Service women were able to obtain appointments for contraceptive care within established TRICARE wait times requirements AND received contraceptive method of choice.
- Less than 25% reported receiving contraceptive counseling
 - · Counseling is voluntary
 - · Survey assessed pre-deployment counseling only
- More than a third reported feeling more comfortable getting care from a non-MHS provider

Survey Follow-up Actions

- Health care provider survey
 - ✓ Identify knowledge and understanding of contraceptive health policies and procedures
 - ✓ Assess provider needs and potential policy improvements
- Standardization of walk-in contraception services
 - √ MTFs by January 2023
 - ✓ Full scope of non-surgical methods of contraception, same-day without an appointment or referral

Dobbs Decision Impacts

"DoD health care providers' current provision of abortion services in cases of rape and incest or where the life of the woman would be endangered if the fetus were carried to term, as well as their provision of contraceptive care, and other reproductive health services, continues to be legal and authorized under Federal law, and it remains DoD policy to provide such services"

Potential Impacts to the Department

- Approximately 40% of Active Duty Service women will have no or severely restricted access to abortion services where they are currently stationed across the U.S.
- Between roughly 6,600-11,900 unintended pregnancies occur annually among Active Duty Service members
 - ✓ Approximately 4,400-4,700 occur in states with restricted state laws
 - ✓ Potential increase in prenatal, delivery and postpartum care
- 63% of those who experienced an unintended pregnancy were not using any form of contraception

Departmental Actions

- Issued a memo to the Force indicating that the Dobbs decision does not impact Military Medical Treatment Facility authorized care.
- Removal of copays for medical appointments associated with contraceptive care
- Initiated comprehensive contraception campaign
 - ✓ Increases Service member and beneficiary awareness of resources for informed decision-making
 - ✓ Supported by Reproductive Health survey
- Secretary of Defense (SecDef) memorandum on ensuring access to reproductive health care, October 2022
- Family planning focus groups
- Reproductive Health Q&As

SecDef Memorandum

- Establishes additional privacy protections for reproductive health information
 - ✓ Allows Service member delay of command pregnancy notification to no later than 20 weeks
 - ✓ Disseminate guidance to health care providers and commanders
- Requires development of health care provider protections
 - ✓ Licensure fee reimbursement for change of state licenses
 - ✓ Support to providers subject to adverse actions when performing their official duties, consistent with federal law

SecDef Memorandum Continued


- Support for Service members and their beneficiaries in accessing non-covered reproductive health care:
 - ✓ Administrative absence (Service members only) and funded travel for non-covered abortions and Assisted Reproductive Technology
 - ✓ Non-covered abortions are those not authorized by Federal law for performance by DoD health care providers
 - ✓ Assisted Reproductive Technology, facilitates family building through non-coital methods

SecDef Memo Continued


- Supports MHS comprehensive contraceptive education campaign
- Expands public facing educational information and resources
- Requires improvements to TRICARE and MHS websites to clarify available care and easy-to-find resources to request assistance
- Policy will be published by the end of December 2022

Way Ahead


- Continued roll out of comprehensive contraception campaign
